
The Mimbres culture was centered near the southwest region of New Mexico. Their pottery was produced between 1000 and 1150 A.D. The iconography used relates to prehistoric Mesoamerican culture as well as Pueblo religious beliefs and mythology. A hole punctured in the center indicates that the bowl was ceremoniously "killed", allowing for the spirit of the image to be free, thus symbolically replenishing the "hole" left behind in nature. This series couples some huge man-made holes with their own Mimbres bowls and is meant to show how far we have come today from seeking a natural balance with the world around us.




Crater Bowls, Nature Made Holes




Slow Motion (a, b, c, d)

After Eadweard Muybridge's photograms of a man throwing a ball.




